Item         has been booked with. When Meet & Companies are investigated, they often close down and are re-established under a different name.         This industry needs regulating – however this cannot be done by the Metropolitan Police. Until this industry is regulated nothing will change. The police have no power to stop these companies operating – that is the responsibility of regulators.         Companies are reported to the authorities, they submit planning applications, appeal decisions and continue to appeal decisions which can mean that it takes nearly 3 years for cease-and-desist letters to be sent.         Have you had feedback from other airports on how they have dealt with similar issues?         Other airports have 'Approved Airport Operator' licences which has helped but not eradicated the problem. The areas around Heathrow have the biggest problem with Meet & Greet companies.         The issue is now who is going to regulate this, it's not entirely Heathrow's fault.         Can Heathrow not stop these individuals from driving into/ from the airport - I was stopped from using Heathrow roads in the past?         It is hard to identify meet & greet drivers by look alone. Drivers who use these companies are still insured under "Jockey Policy" which allows Meet & Greet drivers to drive from the terminal to a car park, whilst being fully insured.         Some areas have had many iterations of illegal parking in fields, there was less crime when squatters/protestors were in the field. Representatives from the details of this meeting to LCF Heathrow Surface Access team will be in members attendance at this meeting Geofencing currently only applies to Uber drivers, but this can be brought up at the meeting with the Surface Access team. **BUSINESS UPDATE – BECKY COFFIN** Traffic figures: Just over 6 million passengers travelled through the airport in April and despite the strikes over Easter we continued to deliver excellent passenger service over the Easter getaway. Following an audit by the Wildlife Trust, Heathrow has retained the Biodiversity Benchmark Award for 2022 with many residents living near these sites. On Sunday 23 April, eight Heathrow colleagues took part in the 2023 London Marathon raising money for the Heathrow Community Trust (HCT) and a charity of their own choice. Runners raised over £10,000 for HCT. Claire Knight, Chair of HCT, spoke earlier this year about funding streams and HCT will close their Communities Together large grant applications on 30<sup>th</sup> May. As part of the coronation celebrations our Community Investment team delivered 10 community days with 63 colleagues volunteering in Stanwell, Stanwell Moor, Harmondsworth & Colnbrook prepping areas ready for their celebrations. Colleagues enjoyed getting out in the local community so thank you to those who gave us the opportunity to do so.
